If you haven't joined a club yet, what are you waiting for? There are tons of club options at the Marine Academy, and you should most definitely get involved!

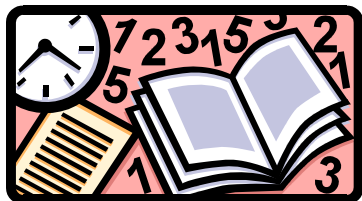

This five-day course taught students, grades 5-8, how to dissect and understand marine animals. It ran from 8am-1pm and was taught by Mrs. Boyd and Mr. Valente. It was a positive experience that bettered all students and prepared those who were interested in applying to MAST in the near future.

Each day was a routine with a dissection, a lesson on a topic, and some kind of quiz or Sandy Hook adventure.

Day one started out with students meeting each other and the first lesson. Students took notes on a lecture about Sandy Hook and the Marine environment. They discussed Cnidarians as well. Then, they dissected a jellyfish and were expected to identify all, although few, parts of this creature. This counted as a quiz and most students enjoyed this experience. Yet, as the days progress-

sed, the dissections became larger and larger as well as more interesting.

Day two was enjoyable for all students. There was a quick quiz on the information learned the previous day. The lesson of the day concerned Bivalves Mollusks. Students were very intrigued by this topic. They dissected a clam and a squid. The most interesting part of these two creatures was the pen, which many students loved extracting. Later that day, we went seining and walked around in the bay. Students could see what marine life was actually like and slowly began to understand it. It was fun for all.

Day three started with another quiz on Day 2’s lesson. Then, a movie and lesson 3 was taught. This concerned Echinoderms and was followed up by a starfish dissection. Students were amazed at all the digestive glands that these creatures were filled with. It was great to watch.

Day four was awesome. We took our daily quiz and then moved on. It was our biggest dissection day so far. We learned about Chordates and their behaviors as well as there

body parts. Then, students were able to dissect the shark one by one. Many were grossed out by the smell of it, but others dug right in. It was a learning experience for everyone.

Day five was Mrs. Boyd’s scheduled boat trip. Students experienced a boat trip like the freshmen do. They trawled and pulled up large amounts of mussels and small spider and rock crabs. They loved picking through the materials and finding different creatures. Many students thought that this was their best day at camp.

The camp was really fun for even us, who were already students at MAST. The students love a variety of the activities we did. “The dissections were really cool! I’ve never done something like that before!” said one student while others enjoyed seining and the boat trip. We hope it encourages its campers to apply here and become students of MAST in the future!

The House That Ruth Built: A History By Stephanie McAlary

On September 21, 2008, Yankee Stadium (also known as The House that Ruth Built) took its final bow when the New York Yankees beat the Baltimore Orioles 7-3.

But why are so many fans upset to see the old stadium go. If you’ve ever been to Yankee Stadium, you know that it is nothing compared to stadiums such as Camden Yards or Rogers Centre.

The old stadium is mostly made of concrete and the seats that people sit in while watching the game are uncomfortable, to put it nicely. However, knowing the history of this stadium and all its importance puts it into perspective on why it is so hard to see the old house go.

Yankee Stadium is one of the most famous sports venues in America, having hosted a variety of events and many historic moments during its existence. The first game at the stadium was held on April 18, 1923, with the Yankees defeating the Boston Red Sox 4-1. However, the Yankees were not the only team to call this place home for a long time. From

1956–1973 the New York Giants football team played all its home games here. On December 28, 1958, Yankee Stadium hosted the NFL championship game, frequently called "The Greatest Game Ever Played." The Baltimore Colts tied the Giants, 17–17, on a field goal with seven seconds left.

Also, as you may be surprised to learn, In 1971 and 1976, the New York Cosmos of the North American Soccer League played their home games at Yankee Stadium. In 1976 the team's star attraction was Pelé. The Brazil native, known as "The King of Football," was considered the best player in the world. The Scottish, club Celtic FC, have also played at Yankee Stadium.

There have been three Papal visits at Yankee Stadium, including Pope John Paul II and the Catholic Church’s current pope, Pope Benedict XVI.

The House that Ruth Built (the nicknamed which is taken from the iconic Babe Ruth) has hosted the MLB All-Star game a total of four times, the first in 1939 in conjunction with the World’s Fair which was being

held in Flushing-Meadows Queens. The fourth time was held this past year in celebration of the final year at Yankee Stadium.

One of the more unique parts of Yankee Stadium is Monument Park. Monument Park is a section of Yankee Stadium which contains the Yankees' retired numbers, a collection of monuments and plaques pertaining to the New York Yankees and other events to take place at the stadium and in the city. It bears statues of past all star players with a description of each underneath. For those who have never taken the opportunity to walk through there, it is a wonderful filled with not only Yankee history but New York history as well.

All in all, Yankee Stadium, may not seem like a much of a loss to those not following the sport. However, when you look back and realize all of the wonderful events that have taken place there, you realize that maybe those old concrete ramps are worth putting up with.

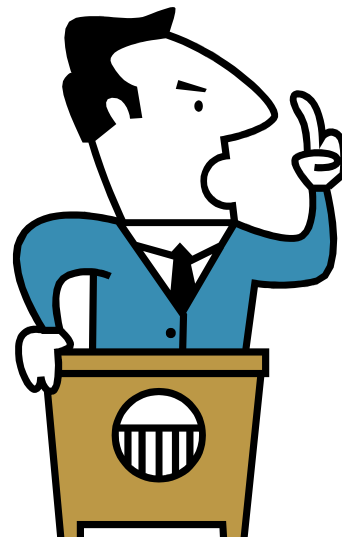

Delays, Delays?

I am certain that all of you have noticed the large-scale construction project taking place on the Highlands Bridge while you drive to school everyday.

And I am sure that many of you have seen the large, orange signs that all seem to have a similar message. Whether it be "Expect Delays..." or, "Delays Expected After 1 P.M..." their message is crystal clear: this construction project could cause some problems for everyone at M.A.S.T.

The Highlands bridge was built in 1936, and has been in dire need of replacement for a few years now, and because of this, it has also become a safety issue. So much so, it was rated the worst movable bridge in our state. Finally, New Jersey has decided to do something about this, and on February 11, the Department of Transportation (DoT) moved forward with plans to build a new bridge to replace the existing one. The project

will cost approximately \$124.5 million, and the bridge should be completed in December, of 2010.

The bridge has been partially removed, so the DoT has gradually shifted the lanes to accommodate the flow of traffic. But this shifting of lanes is what has been causing much of the problems, as the bridge becomes clogged with people trying to get to Sandy Hook or trying to go south. Eventually, the traffic will be redirected to the new, larger bridge, while the old bridge is demolished.

When asked how they felt about the construction, some students seemed a little worried. Sam Wilt, a sophomore, said, "I hope the construction gets done soon, because my bus ride is really long, and with the construction it's worse." Another sophomore, Erika Thompson, had this to say: "I think it is great we're getting a new bridge, but I hope the delays don't get

worse, because I do sports, and sometimes I am late to my games." When Peter Arriaza was asked about the bridge he replied, "Well, obviously it's an inconvenience but I believe better safe than sorry, especially after what happened with the Minneapolis bridge collapse a couple years back."

Clearly, some students are worried about the bridge construction, but so far we at M.A.S.T. have not had it too bad. Sure, we have had a few minor delays, but nothing lasting more than 5 - 15 minutes. However, some students feel even that is too much.

But it is obvious that being a little late is a small sacrifice that we all must pay for the safety and convenience that the new bridge will bring.

In the third week of August two MAST students and two MAST teachers (Mr. Cuttrell and Ms. Green) made their way up to Steven's Institute of Technology in blank, New Jersey. The program that the students had to partake in was an underwater robot program, using nothing other than Legos.

The students, Brian Ruane, of Middletown and Bryanna Schroeter, of Ocean Township, were teamed with two students from Hoboken High School (HHS)..

The goal for each team was to make a water vessel out of Legos that would be able to complete the task in each of the four challenges. Although the four challenges would be difficult within themselves, it was proved that the most difficult challenge throughout the Steven's program was the programming of the motors for the vessels using touch sensors, rotation sensors, or ultra-sound sensors.

The computer program used for this was probably one of the most confusing programs a M.A.S.T. student, or any high school student, could use. It wasn't until the last challenge

that anyone properly understood it. However, our team was able to use it with some success.

In the first challenge, the goal was to have your vessel go forward to a certain point and reverse to a certain point on the surface of the pool in as little time as possible. The MAST and HHS team were able to come in a respectable second place finish in the first challenge. Our team was able to finish in 13.37 seconds, just a tenth of a second behind the first place team.

Then, came the second challenge. The teams had to have their boat make its way in the shape of a crazy eight as fast as possible. The programming for this challenge proved difficult because if you made one mistake on the program your boat would end up going in circles. By the challenge, the MAST and HHS team were able to get the program together and take a first place finish in 9.5 seconds.

In the third challenge, each team had to make a vessel that would be neutrally buoyant in the water. In other words, you had to make a vessel that would float in the middle of the water,

without touching the bottom or coming to the top. The most difficult task of this challenge was creating a vertical motor/propeller in case your boat was not perfectly neutrally buoyant. With this challenge our team was able to pull it together and come in an admirable fourth place finish with a time of 21 seconds.

The fourth challenge was the last challenge and, by far, proved to be the most difficult. The goal was to have your vessel be able to go every direction while being able to stay underwater or above water with collecting balls on the bottom of the pool and placing the balls in the baskets. The balls that had smaller rings on them were worth two points and the balls with the bigger rings were worth one if placed in the bigger basket. If placed in the smaller basket, points were doubled.

The MAST and HHS team sadly were not able to get enough points to be in the top three, although still doing quite well considering the time limit.

All in all, the experience at Steven's Institute of Technology was a great learning experience.
